Capital Spending is far Above the \$33.4 million referendum Amount

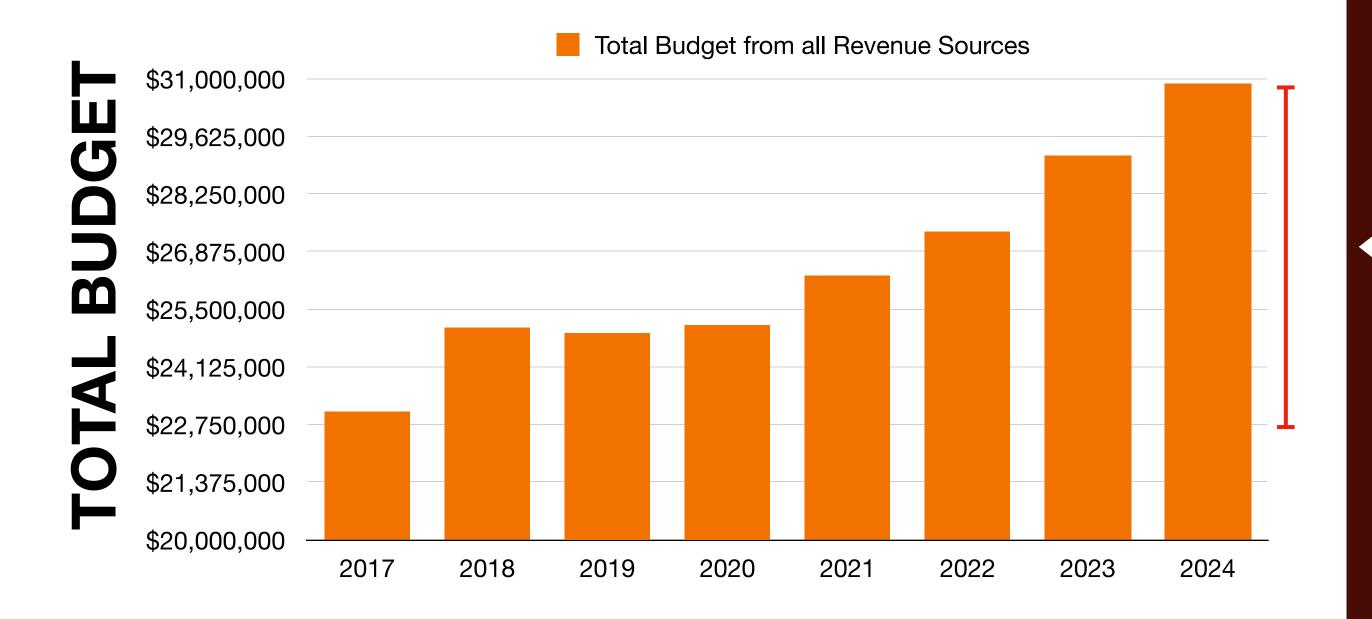

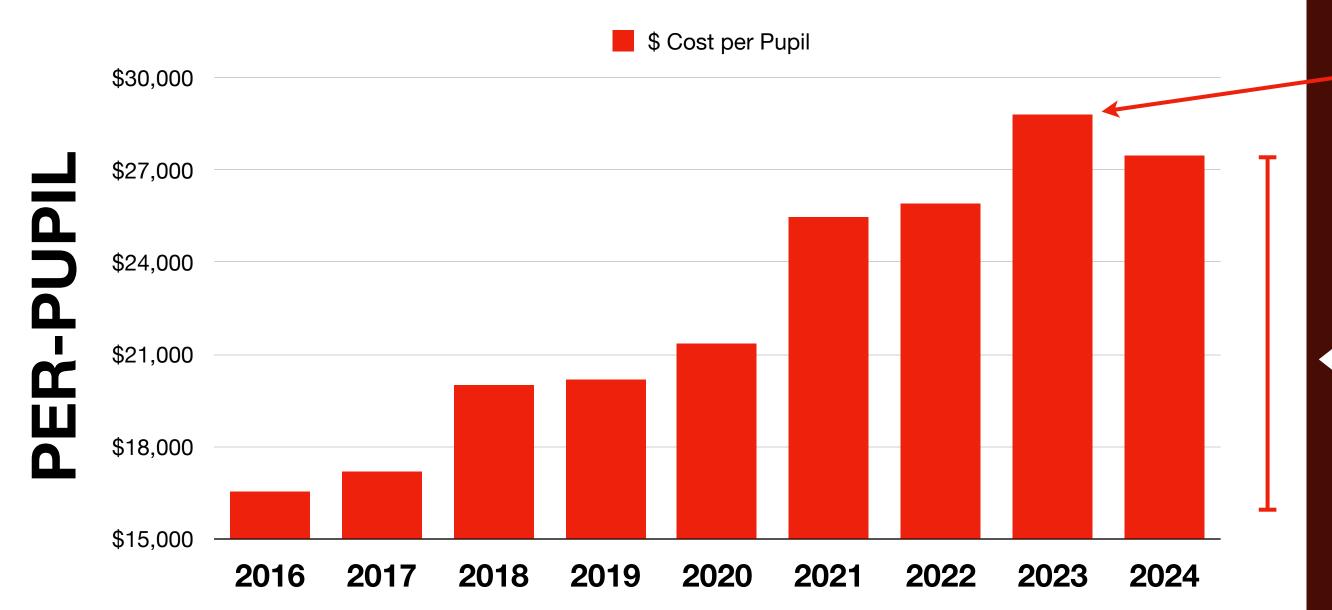

The above table outlines the capital reserves the district has spent or proposes to spend in the near future on school building construction.

This table does NOT include costs such as the \$600,000+ it took to lease the Jesus School for the 2023/2024 school year, and similar knock-on costs to LPS construction.

Leasing the Jesus school cost a tremendous amount and stressed our faculty and staff

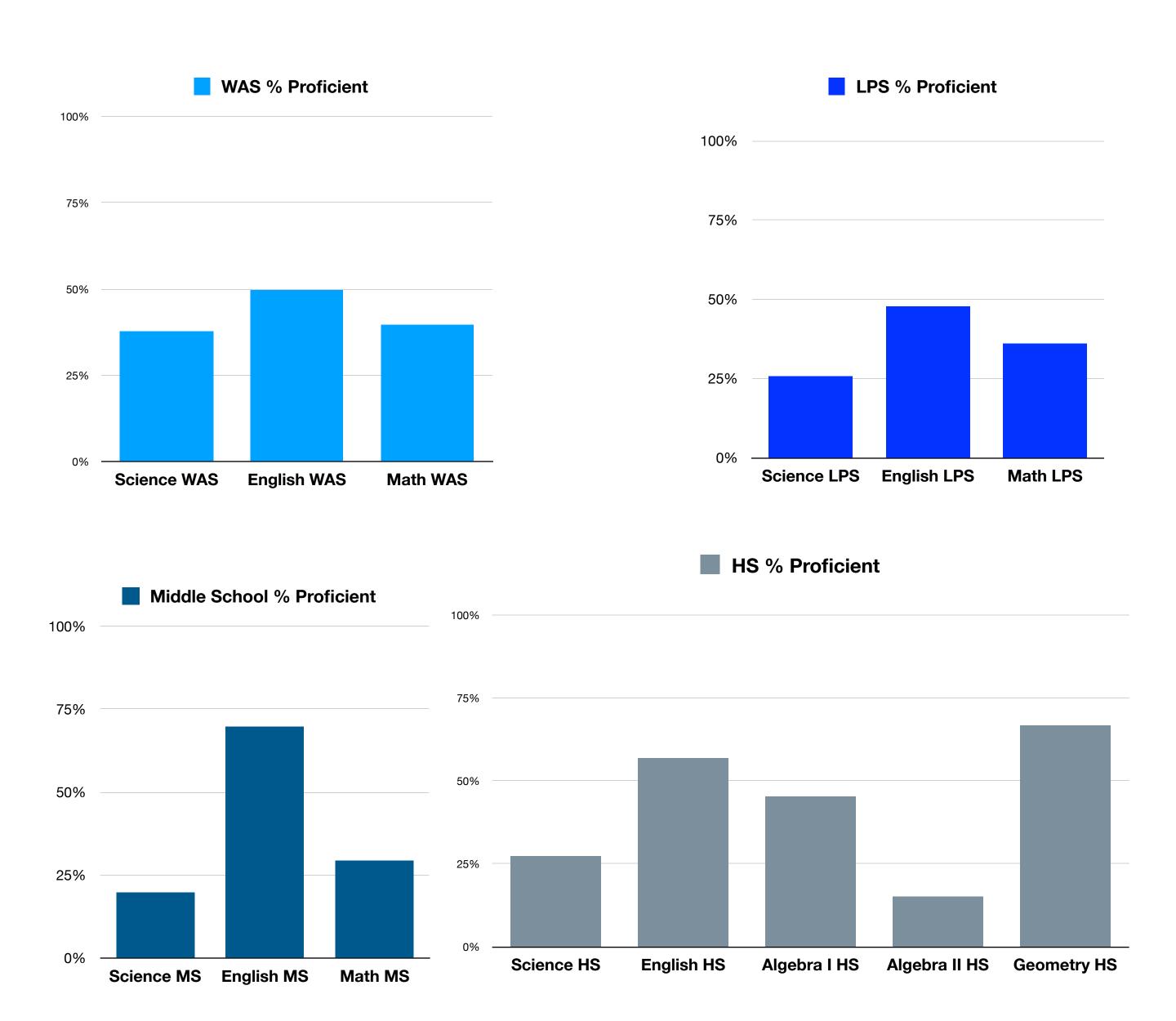


2016-2024: +\$10,911 / Student

Increased cost per pupil over 7 years 66% total increase

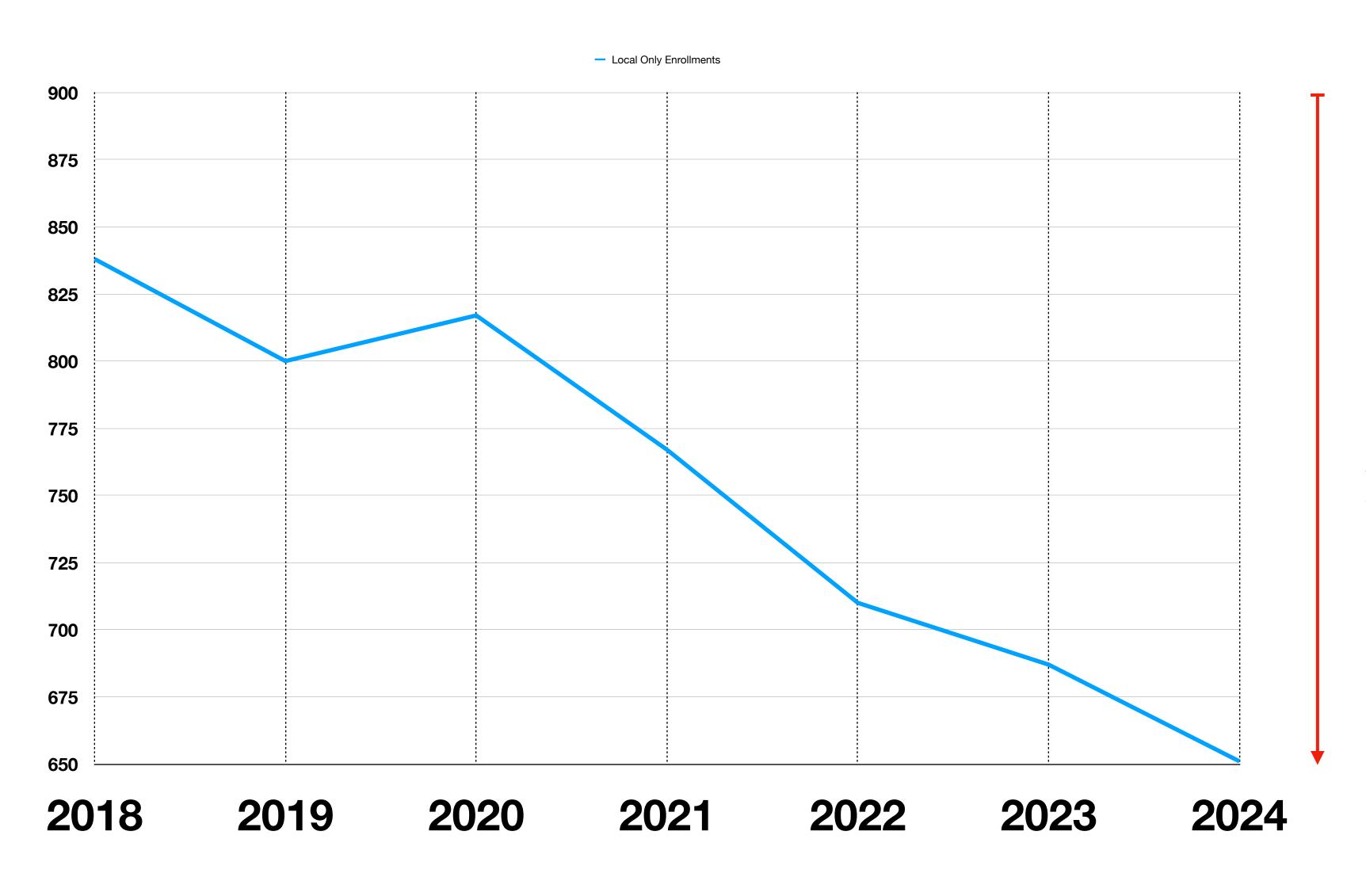
SHRSD STANDARDIZED TEST SCORES

- Our elementary schools cannot even manage to get half of its students proficient in English, Math, or Science
- Standardized scores show a steady decline as students progress through the system, with Math proficiency dropping in most subjects and science proficiency absolutely plummeting
- Poor test scores, and constant budget increases has lead to a flight of students and faculty from the district.

Local district enrollment has been shrinking since the district was created, and this trend shows no sign of abating

SHRSD PreK-Program History

- PreK was historically offered tuition-based (paid) in Lambertville only (LPS)
- NJ State started supporting a "Universal" PreK program a few years ago:
 - State would fund "free" universal PreK programs for districts that apply and qualify
 - Funding would only cover operations and PreK playgrounds, not buildings
 - State requires districts to plan to support their full "universe" of PreK students
- District applied for Universal PreK aid in October 2021
 - Required to provide for up to 90 students (6 classrooms, 4 more than we have)
 - The District does not have 4 extra classrooms
 - In the short term district is splitting kids between WAS and LPS and gets \$1 million/year in aid
 - There is no guarantee the State will fund PreK forever
 - Potential loss of this aid should be considered along with the capital options

Future of District "Universal" PreK

- The following pages outline the longer term options the district has for finding space for Universal PreK
- None of these options are ideal, as the district did not consider additional PreK classrooms as part of the referendum
- All options will involve major compromises in terms of finances, student experience, and impact to parents
- Note that the Universal PreK program is entirely voluntary
- Many districts have held back until they better understand the full costs of the program
- South Hunterdon jumped into the program without fully understanding it
- Universal PreK funding will almost certainly not last indefinitely
- The following pages walk through options presented by the Superintendent in September-October 2024. Note that these options are not the only ones, but those the Superintendent chose to present

Universal PreK Student Capacity Options

Below are Some of the Potential Classroom Options for PreK

NOTE: Numbering of these options do not match the Superintendent's numbering, and adds in a number of factors the Superintendent did not consider.

PreK Option A1 - High School (Minimal)

- Options A1 and A2 involve putting PreK at the High School, and will still move 7-8 grade to the new middle school
- Board determined "this was not feasible" (despite no BOE vote on matter)
- No explanation why cost is so high compared to WAS reconfiguration
- Having toddlers at High School is probably a bad idea

- All PreK will be bussed
- Middle school gym is completely wasted
- WAS can be sold
- Walkability lost for Lambertville PreK
- Empty LPS classrooms

- Board determined "this was not feasible" despite no BOE vote on matter
- No explanation why cost is so high compared to WAS reconfiguration
- Having toddlers at High School probably a bad idea
- All PreK bussed

- Middle school gym is completely wasted
- WAS can be sold
- Walkability lost for Lambertville PreK
- Empty LPS Classrooms

PreK Option B1 - Reconfigure LPS to PreK-3

- Options B1 and B2 involve putting all PreK students at LPS, which would mean changing the classroom configurations
- B1 involves reconfiguring LPS from PreK-4 to PreK-3
- Superintendent Suozzo says this is not feasible as the MS has no space to be a 4-8 school. Referendum left 0 room for expansion.
- MS could be 4-7 school, with 8th grade staying at HS. Suozzo says this "doesn't make educational sense", without any references or citations
- Walkability retained for Lambertville PreK
- WAS can be sold

PreK Option B2 - Increase LPS K-4 classroom sizes

- Retain LPS overall grade configuration
- Increase K-4 class sizes to make room for more PreK classes
- Walkability retained for Lambertville PreK
- WAS can be sold
- No room for expansion due to referendum choices
- Larger class sizes
- HS 7th and 8th grade classroom spaces and gym wasted

- No WAS renovation, re-use existing spaces
- Non-ADA bathrooms suddenly doesn't matter?
- WAS cannot be sold
- PreK universe split
- Wasted grade 7-8 space at MS

PreK Option D - All PreK to WAS

- Renovate WAS and move all 5-6 PreK classrooms there permanently
- LPS becomes K-4
- Lambertville loses walkability for PreK
- LPS underutilized (was planned to have PreK)
- WAS cannot be sold

- Taxpayers were vehemently told WAS could not be renovated during 2021 referendum push
- Majority of WAS empty
- 7th and 8th grade areas at HS empty

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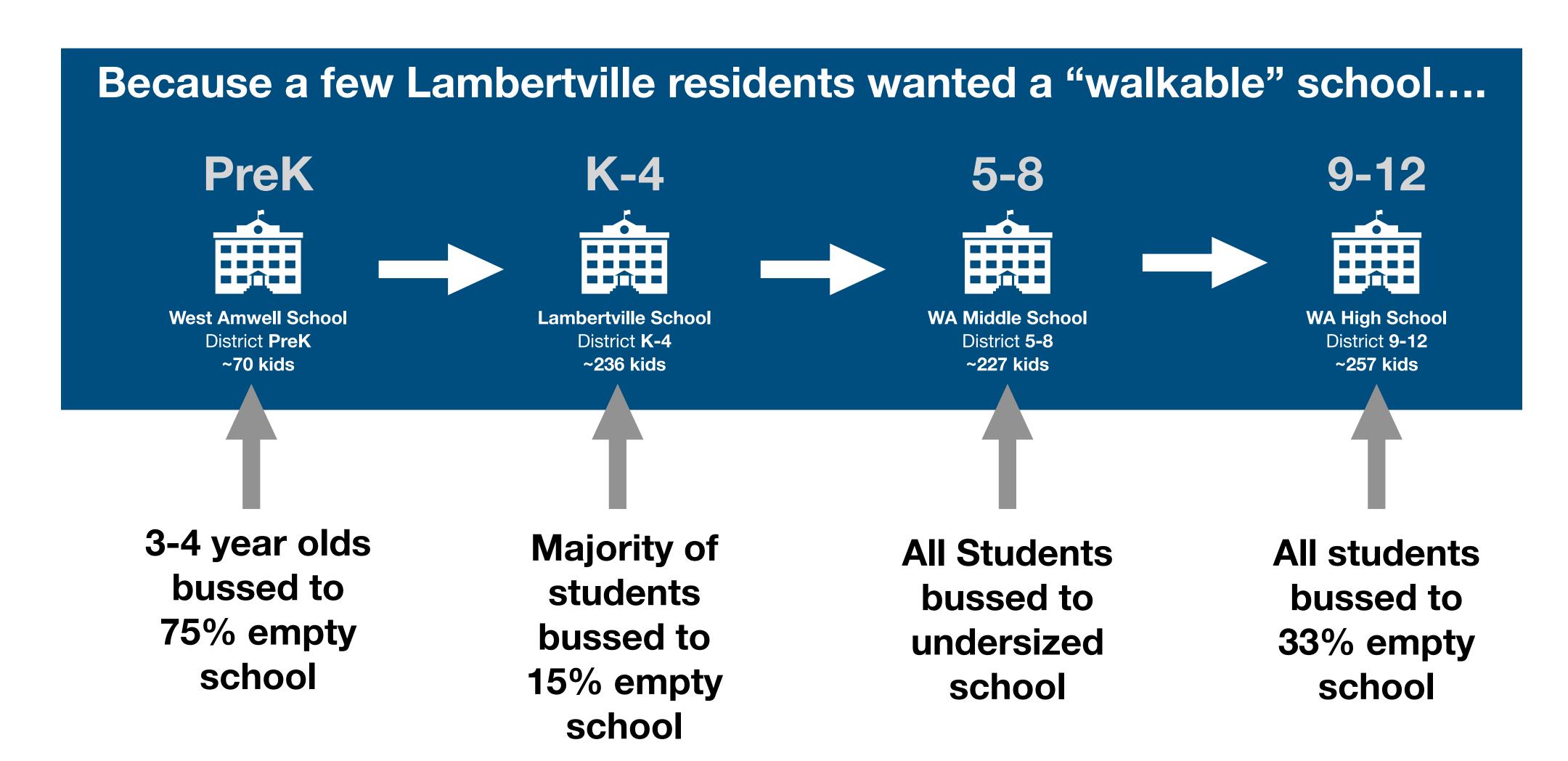
PreK Option E - Partner with 3rd parties

- Look to 3rd parties to fill gaps in classrooms
- Sparse options, one local school refusing, St. John's already ransomed district for \$600K in 2023. How much will they fleece the district for open ended PreK program?
- WAS can be sold
- MS 7th and 8th grade areas unused
- District has less control

Universal PreK Questions and Observations

PreSchool Expansion Aid vs. Universal PreK Program

Words matter. Superintendent Suozzo focuses on Pre School Expansion Aid (PEA). The focus of the Murphy administration is **Universal** PreK. "Universal" PreK means the district providing space for all 3 and 4 year olds in the district, which would require seats for 90 students Many districts have hesitated to take PEA as they evaluate the all-in costs to each district. Why didn't South do this in 2021? What happens if the State stops the PEA program? Because - eventually they will. How will we pay the \$1 million/year bill on our own?

General Questions Around Program

Why are STEM, Math, Art "specials" called out as being difficult to provide for? What is being done in these areas for 3 and 4 year olds?

Why are we proposing spending millions of capital budgets on three and four year olds, and almost nothing on high school students? Where is the cost-benefit analysis broken down by grade and grade-complexity and benefits (e.g. by definition HS programs will be more comprehensive and complex than those for toddlers).

Why isn't "sale of WAS" one of the evaluation criteria?

Why isn't "walkability" one of the evaluation criteria?

How is the board "determining" what options are and are not feasible? Where are the votes recorded for this "determination"?

What is the projected percentage uptake rate for Lambertville, West Amwell, and Stockton? Does the entire District need Universal PreK, or is this another Lambertville special perk?

High School PreK Option Questions

Why is the HS renovation \$3.5-\$5 million and nearly equivalent work at WAS only \$2 million?

What is being done with the completely wasted Middle School gym (regardless of PreK)?

HS Program expansion - this has already happened. What do these programs have to do with classroom space?

CEA Space - if we have a space crunch, why are we selling facilities access to CEA for a mere \$160,000/year?
